The Associate of Arts degree (A.A.) at JCCC is a general transfer degree and partners well with the first two years of these bachelor's degree programs. Students pursuing the A.A. may select courses that satisfy both the A.A. degree requirements and lower-division requirements for a bachelor's degree at KU Edwards. The elective hours within the A.A. allow students to complete additional general education and lower-division courses required for specific majors. The A.A. degree requires completion of 60 credit hours. JCCC degree requirements can be found at: http://catalog.jccc.edu/degreerequirements/.

A maximum of 75 community college credit hours can be applied toward a bachelor's degree at KU Edwards. Contact your KU Edwards academic success coach for more information. Meeting with a JCCC counselor is strongly recommended for selection of appropriate courses at JCCC.

Admission

Applicants are assured admission with 24+ transferable credit hours with a GPA of 2.5. Only transfer grades of "C-" or higher will count towards KU degree requirements. All grades count in the transferable GPA used for admission decisions. Apply at https://admissions.ku.edu/ by selecting the Transfer application and selecting the Edwards Campus.

Degree Requirements

Students must earn 120 hours for graduation, of which 45 must be upper-division (junior/senior). Community college courses do not transfer as upper-division hours. Thirty of the total 120 hours must be taken at KU. Students must satisfy the KU Core 34, the BA or BGS degree-specific requirements, all courses in the major, and enough electives to total 120 hours. Major requirements are the same for those doing the BA and BGS, but degree requirements differ.

KU Core 34 Requirements

- Effective Fall 2024: Students transferring to KU, with an AA, AFA or AS degree from JCCC will be considered to have satisfied KU's Core 34 general education curriculum.
- Effective Fall 2024: Students who transfer to KU, without completing AA, AFA or AS degree will have courses evaluated on a course-by-course basis toward meeting KU requirements. Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) Degree-Specific Requirements

Students pursuing the B.A. must meet these specific requirements in addition to completing the KU Core and the major.

- Quantitative Reasoning (3 Credits): Students completing the B.A. must have a second quantitative course. A list of
 courses that satisfy this requirement may be found on the KU College Advising and Academic Services website at
 https://collegeadvising.ku.edu/ba-quantitative-reasoning-courses. Courses with JCCC equivalents are listed on page
 7 of this guide.
- 2. Laboratory or Field Experience (Variable Credits): This course must be an academic-credit-bearing laboratory or field experience. This course may be taken in conjunction with a lecture course, but the course combination must contain a laboratory. Courses that fulfill this requirement will contain the code "LFE" and may be found in the Schedule of Classes.
- 3. Writing (6 Credits): Students must complete six credit hours (two courses) of collegiate-writing-level instruction. A student whose initial placement is ENGL 101 (Composition) must take ENGL 101 and ENGL 102 (Critical Reading and Writing). A student whose initial placement is in ENGL 102 or ENGL 105 (and who does not have credit for ENGL 101) must take ENGL 102 or ENGL 105 (the honors equivalent of ENGL 102) and ENGL 205.
- 4. Non-English Language Proficiency (Variable Credits): Students must demonstrate fourth-semester proficiency in a single non-English language, OR third semester proficiency in a first non-English language and first-semester proficiency in a second non-English language. Students should check with their JCCC counselor for placement into the appropriate courses.

Bachelor of General Studies (B.G.S.) Degree-Specific Requirements

Students pursuing the B.G.S. must meet these specific requirements in addition to completing the KU Core and the major.

- 1. Completion of the requirements of a single B.G.S. major AND a secondary field of academic study (a second degree offered by the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences (CLAS) or another KU professional school, a second CLAS major or co-major, a minor offered by CLAS or another school, or two certificates offered by CLAS or another school).
- 2. Completion of an approved upper-level career preparation course (minimum 3 credit hours total) taken at KU.

Major Information

The KU Edwards Campus offers the following B.A. and B.G.S. programs through the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences. Following are descriptions of the majors with suggested coursework that should be taken as a part of the associate's degree at JCCC.

Law and Society, BA/BGS

Law and Society is an interdisciplinary field that examines how law works in practice in public administration, courts, the non-profit sector, policy, policing, and the justice system. As a field, law and society explores social movements, government practice, and reform. Students with this degree may pursue work in a variety of settings including criminal justice organizations, non-profits, policy think tanks, and political institutions.

Literature, Language and Writing, BA/BGS

A degree in English will help develop the skills of dealing with concepts and abstractions, creativity, and good communication and people skills. The undergraduate degree in literature, language and writing is an excellent base from which to explore career options and good preparation for a variety of advanced degrees in areas such as business or law. Students should complete ENGL 121*, ENGL 122* and a 200-level English course at JCCC. These are prerequisites for the upper-level English courses in the major at KU Edwards.

Psychology, BA/BGS

A bachelor's degree in psychology provides undergraduate students with a broad knowledge of psychology to achieve both personal and professional goals. A psychology major can be useful for careers in business, teaching, medicine, nursing, law, social work, counseling, student services, child development, administration or human resources. Some students complete the major to become psychologists themselves. Through program curriculum, students will have a better understanding of human behavior, thinking and emotion.
